#### "Nuestra independencia no está a negociación"

#### Engorda Adán Augusto su cochinito ¡11.000%!

El morenista Adán Augusto López elevó en un 11 mil por ciento, en 2025, el monto de recursos de una partida en el Senado de la República que maneja a discreción. Con base en un documento del Comité de Administración, mientras en 2024 se ejercieron 8 millones 69 mil pesos, para 2025 esa misma bolsa tuvo un crecimiento exorbitante: a 894 millones de pesos, equivalente a 11 mil por ciento más. La cifra corresponde al Capítulo 4000 de "Transferencias, asignaciones, subsidios y otras ayudas", cuyo manejo queda a discreción de la Junta de Coordinación Política, en manos del morenista Adán Augusto López.

## **7 de cada 10 niños deportados de EU viajaban solos**

Ante las políticas migratorias impulsadas por Donald Trump, las deportaciones de niñas, niños y adolescentes mexicanos registraron 7 mil 463 casos entre enero y noviembre de 2025, de los cuales más de 68.65% no viajaban acompañados, de acuerdo con datos del Instituto Nacional de Migración. No obstante, estas cifras también reflejan una reducción significativa en comparación con el último año de la administración de Joe Biden y los primeros meses del gobierno de Trump, ya que en todo 2024 se contabilizaron 30 mil 320 menores deportados a territorio mexicano, lo que representa una disminución de 75.38% en los primeros 11 meses de 2025.

## **EU apura el retiro de sanciones a Venezuela para vender petróleo.**

El secretario del Tesoro de Estados Unidos, Scott Bessent, dijo a Reuters que las sanciones adicionales impuestas por su país a Venezuela podrían levantarse tan pronto como la próxima semana para facilitar las ventas de petróleo. También aseguró que se reunirá la próxima semana con los responsables del Fondo Monetario Internacional (FMI) y del Banco Mundial (BM) sobre su reanudación de las relaciones con Venezuela. Bessent declaró el viernes en una entrevista que casi 5 mil millones de dólares de los activos monetarios de Venezuela actualmente congelados de Derechos Especiales de Giro (DEG) del FMI podrían utilizarse para ayudar a reconstruir la economía del país.

## **EU busca justificación legal para combatir a los cárteles en México**

## Comprarán 4.7 millones de dosis de la hexavalente

El Gobierno de México pretende adquirir 4.7 millones de dosis de la vacuna hexavalente este año, con lo que busca revertir la tendencia descendente en la protección de los niños de un año o menos. De acuerdo con los Lineamientos de Operación del Programa de Vacunación E033 para 2026, el sector salud invertirá mil 681.8 mdp para la producción y adquisición de los biológicos que protegen a la población infantil contra seis enfermedades: difteria, tétanos, tos ferina, hepatitis B, Haemophilus influenza tipo b y poliomielitis.

#### Suspenden servicio de hemodiálisis en hospital IMSS Bienestar de Zihuatanejo; 120 pacientes en riesgo crítico

La suspensión del servicio de hemodiálisis en el hospital IMSS-Bienestar "Dr. Bernardo Sepúlveda Gutiérrez" ha generado una crisis sanitaria que mantiene en riesgo de muerte a alrededor de 120 pacientes de Zihuatanejo y municipios cercanos de la Costa Grande, quienes dependen de este tratamiento de manera periódica para sobrevivir. La crisis no se limita al servicio de hemodiálisis. Pacientes y trabajadores denunciaron un deterioro en las condiciones generales del hospital, incluyendo: Falta de alimentos para los pacientes, escasez de sábanas y ropa de cama, desabasto de medicamentos básicos, entre ellos suero antialacrán, esencial en una región donde estos incidentes son recurrentes.

#### Justifica coordinadora del IMSS Bienestar falta de medicinas y de atención nocturna en casas de salud; ¿no que estamos como en dinamarca?

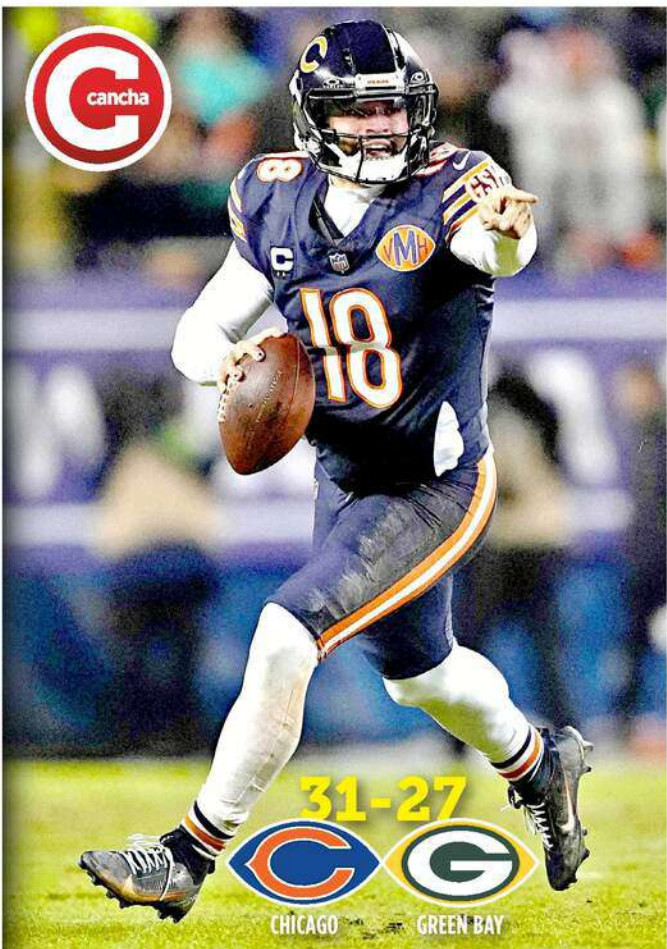

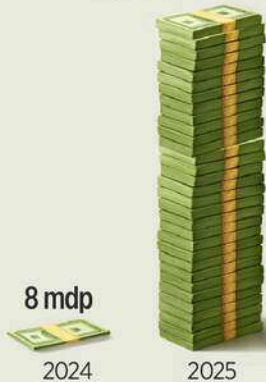

## Atacan a líder de asociación que él fundó

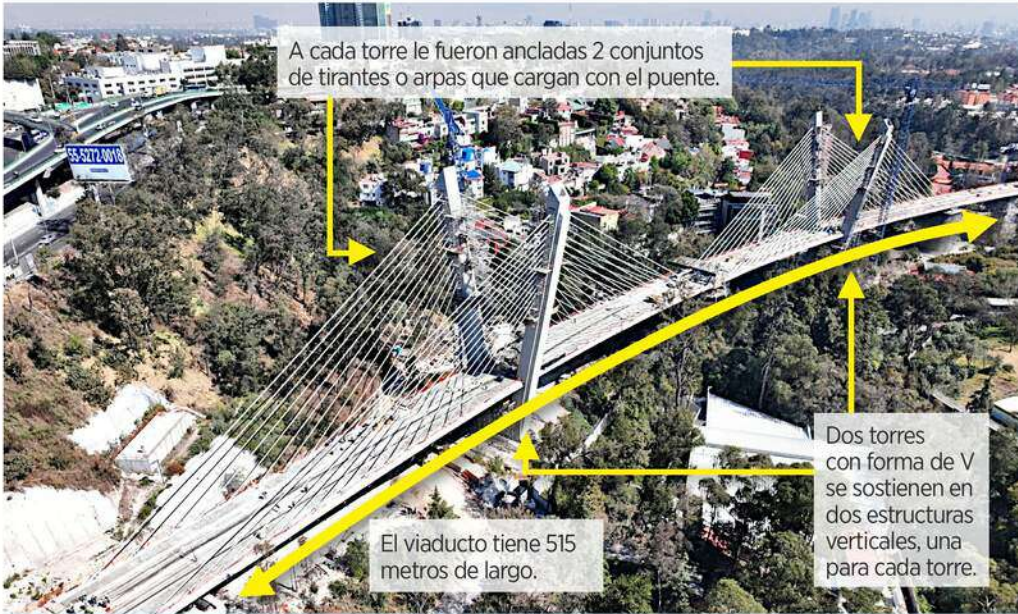

# La IA y las *deepfakes* amenazan democracia

La inteligencia artificial, el uso de granjas de bots y otras tecnologías utilizadas en la política electoral han llegado a un punto crítico donde la credibilidad está en duda, advirtió Gisela Rubach.

En entrevista con **Excelsior**, la experta en marketing político alerta que, sin una regulación legal y ética clara, el uso de herramientas como los *deepfakes* y el procesamiento masivo de datos personales conducirá a una democracia virtual, en la que el contacto directo con la gente será la única defensa contra la desinformación.

Alertó que los comicios en México y en el mundo tienen un nuevo protagonista: el metaestratega, quien sabe qué le gusta escuchar a la gente y qué mensajes deben enviarse para generar aceptación o rechazo. Para Rubach, el tema de fondo es el uso del *big data*, el *machine learning*, los bots, la inteligencia artificial y los algoritmos. “Aquí es donde advierto un gran riesgo: la manipulación de la información”.

Actualmente, dijo, ya existe la capacidad de decirle a cada persona exactamente lo que quiere escuchar, cómo quiere escucharlo y también saber qué mensajes no desea recibir.

“Con base en eso, se implementan estrategias de bombardeo digital utilizando bots y granjas automatizadas. Incluso, ya hay

candidatos que cuentan con su propio chatbot para contestar llamadas o mensajes de WhatsApp. Ya no es el candidato quien responde directamente, sino su versión digital o “doble” automatizado.

Hoy, pensar en que repartir despensas o bultos de cemento resolverá una elección, es una visión limitada.

“Sí, puede funcionar en

ciertos segmentos, pero no en otros, especialmente entre los jóvenes, que ya son completamente digitales”, indicó.

Por ejemplo, los candidatos deben pensar en estar presentes en plataformas como Roblox, en el mundo de los videojuegos e incluso en el metaverso.

# Se desploman decomisos y muertes por fentanilo

**El tráfico de la sustancia desde México hacia Estados Unidos disminuyó 46% en el último año**

Durante el año fiscal 2025, las incautaciones de fentanilo en la frontera entre México y Estados Unidos registraron su nivel más bajo desde 2021, además de que las muertes por sobredosis de esta sustancia en Estados Unidos disminuyeron 24% el año pasado.

Informes de la Oficina de Aduanas y Protección Fronteriza de Estados Unidos (CBP) y de la Oficina en Washington para Asuntos Latinoamericanos (WOLA) indican que la baja en decomisos coincide con el

inicio de la administración de Sheinbaum y la intensificación de operativos contra laboratorios clandestinos y precursores químicos en territorio mexicano.

El pasado 15 de diciembre el presidente de Estados Unidos, Donald Trump, declaró al fentanilo “arma de destrucción masiva”, con lo cual pretende realizar acciones militares contra los cárteles que trafican esa droga.

Una investigación de la Facultad de Políticas Públicas de la Universidad de Maryland, conocida a través de la publicación *Science* el pasado 7 de enero, con datos de los Centros para el Control y Prevención de Enfermedades (CDC), señala que la reducción del consumo de fentanilo en Estados Unidos es una tendencia consistente.

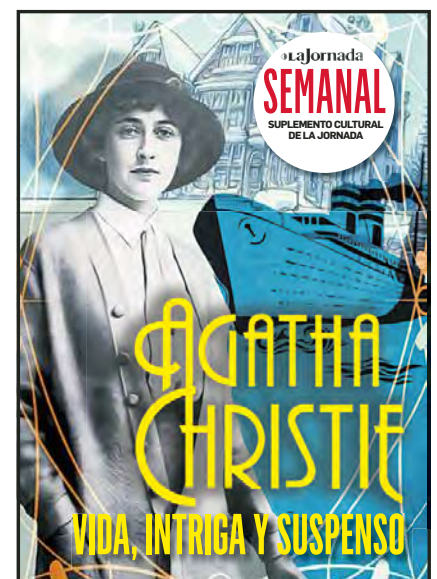

## México acumula una década a la baja en cobertura de la inmunización infantil

El Gobierno de México pretende adquirir 4.7 millones de dosis de la vacuna hexavalente este año, con lo que busca revertir la tendencia descendente en la protección de los niños de un año o menos.

De acuerdo con los Lineamientos de Operación del Programa de Vacunación E033 para 2026, el sector salud in-

vertirá mil 681.8 millones de pesos para la producción y adquisición de los biológicos que protegen a la población infantil contra seis enfermedades: difteria, tétanos, tos ferina, hepatitis B, Haemophilus influenza tipo b y poliomielitis.

Los lineamientos reconocen que México acumula una década a la baja en cobertura

de vacunación infantil. En 2016, por ejemplo, cuando todavía se aplicaba la dosis pentavalente, el país aplicó 6.5 millones de dosis; 6.2 millones en 2018, cuando se introdujo el modelo de hexavalente (que incluyó la inmunización contra poliomielitis).

En 2020, año de la pandemia, los números cayeron a 5.1 millones de dosis. Pero las cifras se desplomaron en 2024, cuando sólo se aplicaron 3.7 millones, una caída de 43 por ciento respecto a 2016. **Pág. 6**

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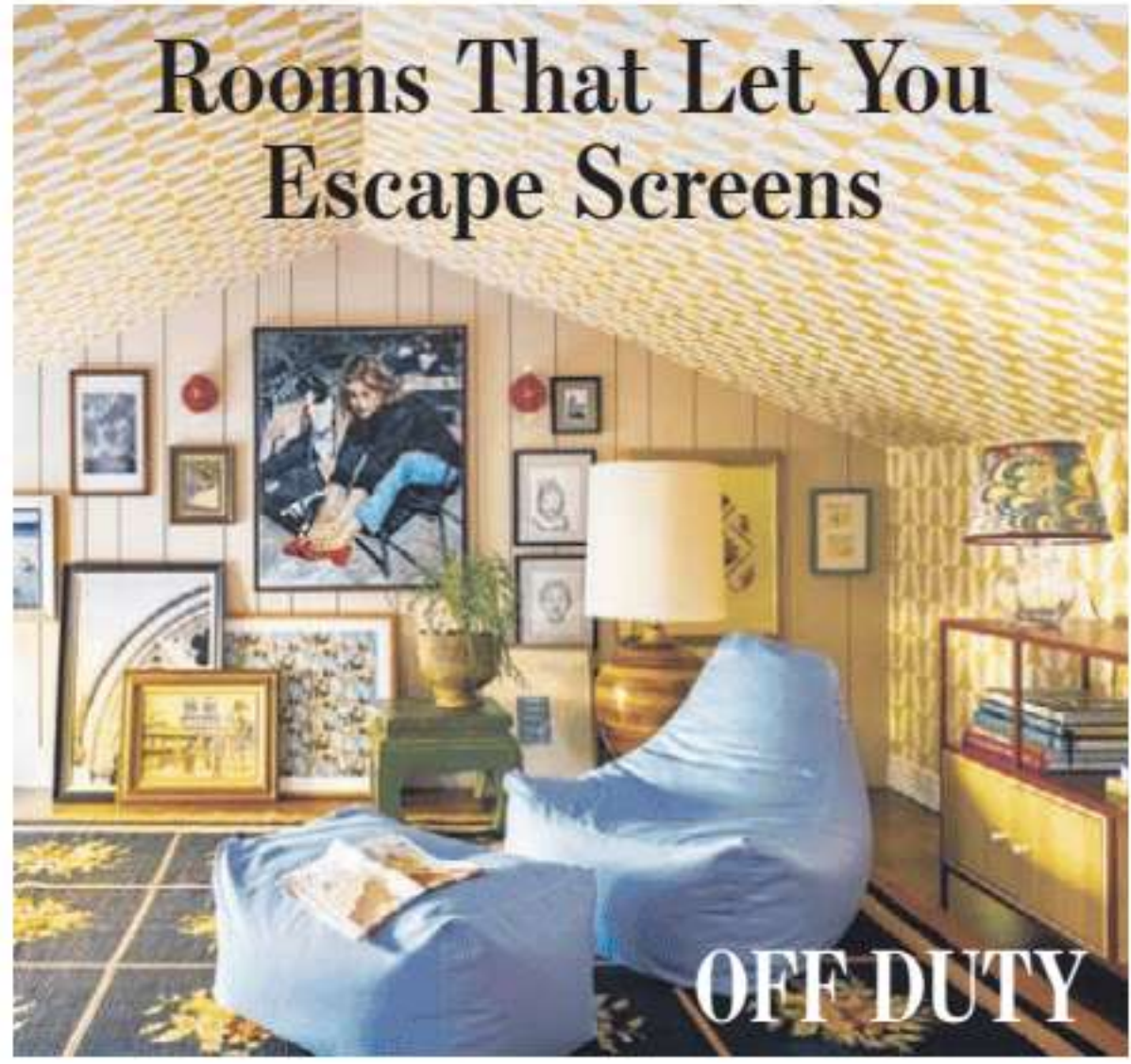

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# Job Gains Cool, Cap a Weak Year

Payrolls rose by 50,000 in December as unemployment ticked down to 4.4%

U.S. employers added jobs at a subdued pace in December, capping a year in which the country's labor market lost considerable momentum. Outside of the two most recent recessions, 2025 saw the lowest pace of average monthly job growth since 2003.

The U.S. economy added a

seasonally adjusted 50,000 jobs in December, the Labor Department said Friday. That was a slight slowdown from November's 56,000 gain and undershot economists' expectations for a 73,000 increase.

The unemployment rate ticked down to 4.4% last month, although it has drifted up from 4% last January.

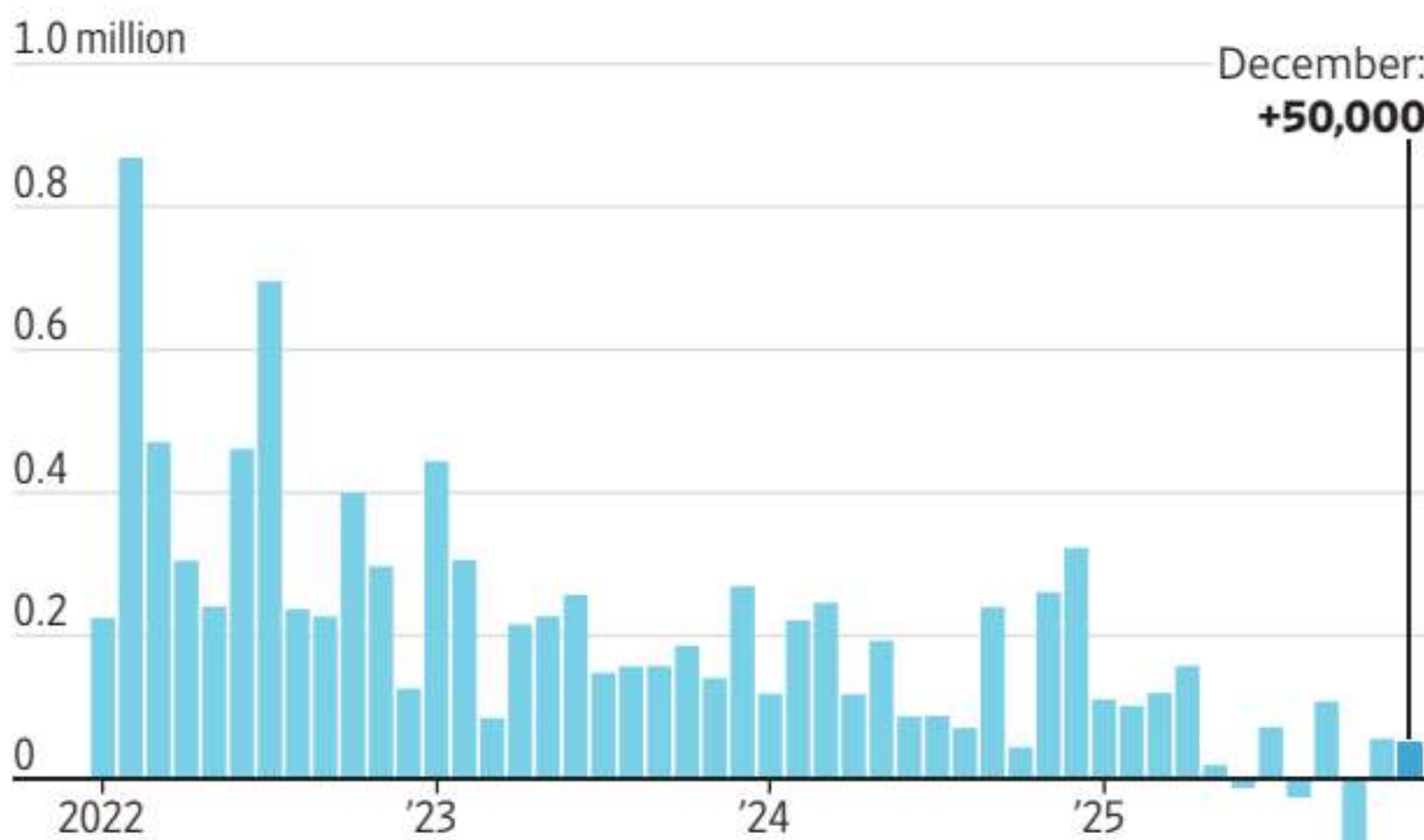
All told, employers added 584,000 new jobs in 2025—or about 49,000 jobs a month, on average. That is a marked deceleration from 2024, when the economy added two million jobs, at a pace of 168,000 a month.

"We are at an inflection point," said U.S. Bank Chief Economist Beth Ann Bovino. Businesses that staffed up rapidly in the postpandemic years are pulling back on hiring, she said. Although economic growth has remained strong, with consumers and businesses continuing to spend, "the jobs market is very fragile—the unemployment rate is low, but businesses aren't hiring."

Headed into 2026, the labor

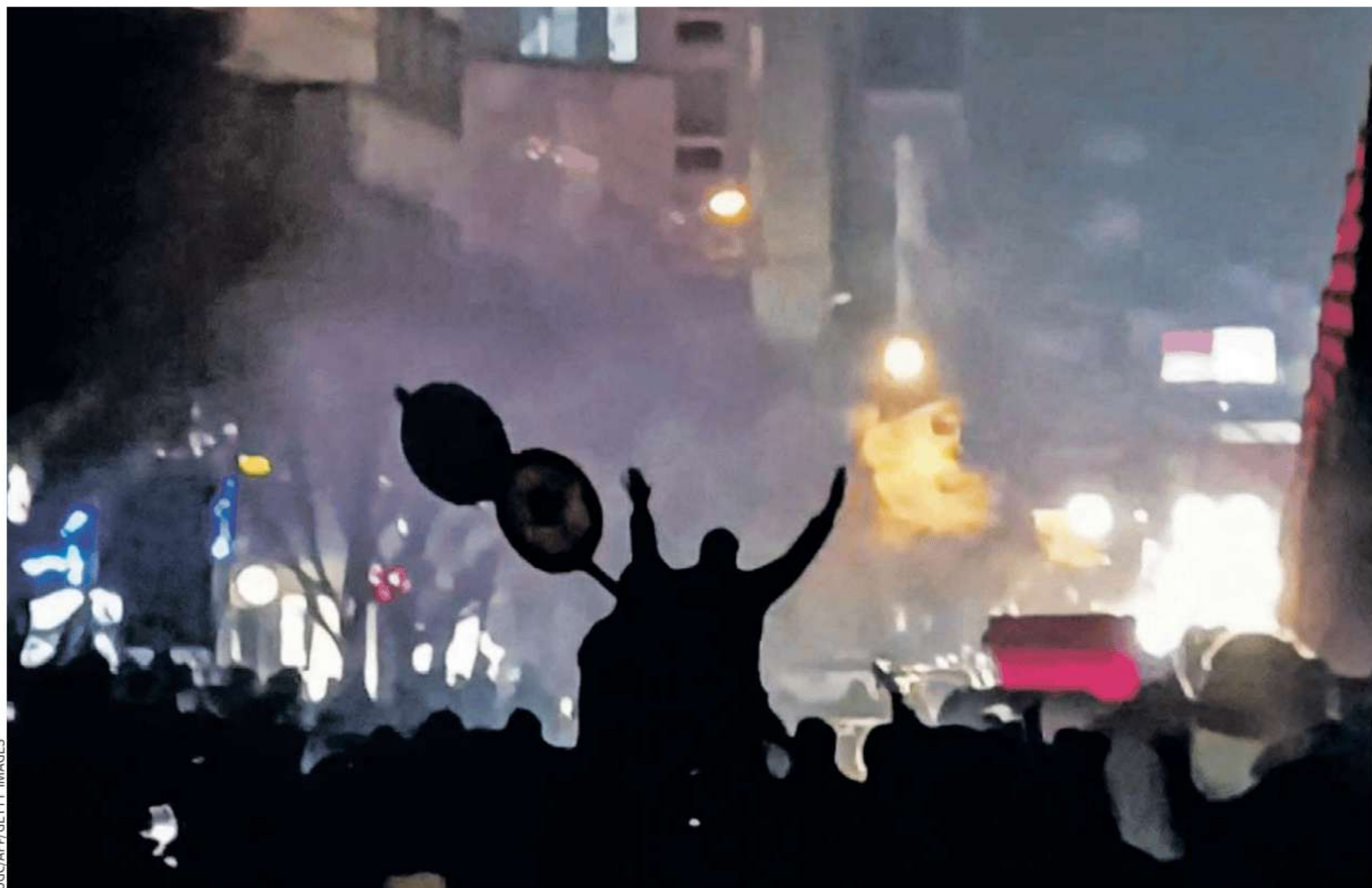

# Iran Protesters Rally Behind Son Of Former Shah as Unrest Grows

As Iranian protests grow in size, an unlikely figure is gaining prominence—the son of the country's reviled shah, who was toppled in the 1979 revolution.

Iranians across the country are chanting slogans in support of Reza Pahlavi, whose father, Mohammed Reza Pahlavi, ruled the country for decades.

The chants come as the

tone of the protests, which began with outrage over a falling currency and soaring prices, is shifting from economic concerns to attacks on the legitimacy of the theocratic regime itself. Protesters shouting anti-regime slogans filled streets in Tehran on Thursday night in the largest demonstrations in years. Videos showed burned out cars and a mosque.

"Long live the Shah," shouted protesters in a shop-

ping center in Tehran, as others set fire to a nearby government building, according to a video verified by Storyful, which is owned by Wall Street Journal parent News Corp.

"This is the last battle," thousands chanted at another march elsewhere in the capital, adding, "Pahlavi will return."

The 65-year-old Pahlavi's prominence is a departure from previous bouts of protest, when the heir of the

controversial dynasty was rarely evoked. His father, who ruled Iran from the 1940s, was widely despised in Iran for his autocratic rule, his political repression and what critics saw as his subservience to the U.S.

Few analysts think Pahlavi has a real path to the throne or leadership in Iran. His improved reputation in recent years says more about the

## President Blindsides Housing Investors

Blackstone Chief Executive Officer Stephen Schwarzman helped launch Wall Street into the business of buying and renting out single-family homes in the aftermath of the 2008 housing crash.

This past week, his firm and others across the industry were blindsided when President Trump—a property mogul himself who many in the sector consider an ally—said he plans to boot investors from the market.

Though they regained some ground later in the week, shares of the two big publicly traded single-family landlords, Invitation Homes and AMH, shed 6% and 4.3%, respectively, on Wednesday.

Shares of Blackstone were hit, too. The firm financed the creation of Invitation Homes but has since sold all its stock. It now owns smaller rival Tricon Residential. ## Trump's Fixation With Foreign Oil

Venezuela is latest example of wanting to leverage military might for energy

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## Trump’s ‘Superstar’ Judges Backed Him 133-12 in ‘25

### On Appeals, Jurists Appointed by President Lean Toward Defending His Agenda

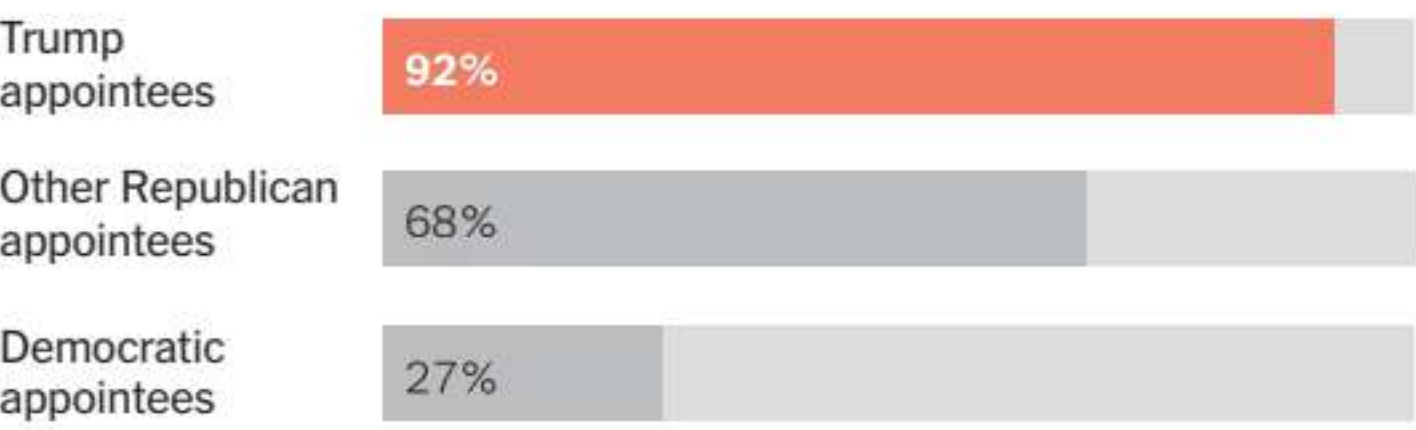

President Trump has found a powerful but obscure bulwark in the appeals court judges he appointed during his first term. They have voted overwhelmingly in his favor when his administration’s actions have been challenged in court in his current term, a New York Times analysis of their 2025 records shows. Time and again, appellate judges chosen by Mr. Trump in his first term reversed rulings made by district court judges in his second, clearing the way for his policies and gradually eroding a perception early last year that the legal system was thwarting his efforts to amass presidential power. When Mr. Trump criticized a ruling from a so-called “Obama judge” in 2018, Chief Justice John G. Roberts Jr. responded that “we do not have Obama judges or Trump judges, Bush judges or Clinton judges.” But the data suggests that in the 13 appellate courts, there is increasingly such a thing as a Trump judge. The president’s appointees voted to allow his policies to take effect 133 times and voted against them only 12 times. Ninety-two percent of their total votes were in favor of the administration. That figure far outstrips support for Mr. Trump’s agenda from appeals court judges appointed by other Republican presidents, and from Mr. Trump’s appointees to the district courts. The Times analyzed every judicial ruling on Mr. Trump’s second-term agenda, from Jan. 20 to Dec. 31 of last year, or more than 500 orders issued across 900 cases. About half of rulings at the appellate level were in Mr. Trump’s fa-

vor — better than his performance with the district courts, though worse than his record at the Supreme Court, where the rulings on his agenda have almost all been on a preliminary basis in response to emergency applications. Experts who have studied the voting patterns of federal judges have found that, even before Mr. Trump, their rulings had some degree of alignment with the partisan positions of the president who appointed them. On the Supreme Court, for instance, where the behavior has been closely studied, justices have shown a decades-long tilt toward their appointing president, a 2016 study found. The correlation between ideology and voting among judges in the Times analysis extended beyond those appointed by Mr. Trump. Appellate judges appointed by Democratic presidents voted against Mr. Trump’s agenda 73 percent of the time, compared to 32 percent of the time by appellate judges appointed by Republicans. But the impact of Mr. Trump’s appeals judges on his own agenda has been hard to overstate, given the glut of litigation over the president’s expansive executive actions and the pushback they have encountered from district court judges. The uniformity of the judges’ votes is “reason for serious concern,” said Mark L. Wolf, a former federal judge nominated by President Ronald Reagan. Judge Wolf recently retired so he could speak more freely about what he has

## Overseas actions pull focus from living costs

Trump's opening moves in midterm election year cloud affordability push

In the closing weeks of 2025, President Donald Trump gave a prime-time speech on affordability and launched a swing-state rally tour that his advisers said would show voters his focus on domestic concerns — a messaging push intended to ramp up at the start of the year.

## Iran on edge as protests, government threats grow

## After fleeing the Taliban, they felt safe in America

But a shooting in D.C. has changed everything for Afghan refugees

MANHATTAN, KAN. — Inside a small beige room in a modest beige house, three Afghan refugees gathered around a long table where a lifelong Kansan had prepared for them a lesson about the Constitution.

"When the U.S. fought for freedom, they needed to create new rules," she told them on a Monday evening in early December. "It starts with the phrase 'We the People.' Remember that. We the people."

Rohina Safa, 28, scribbled notes as she learned about the power of citizenship, clinging to a hope that she and the others might one day gain it. Nearly four years ago, she and the two other Afghans at the table fled their homeland to escape persecution from the Taliban. When they set foot in America, lawmakers and veterans groups across the nation eagerly embraced them. The urge to help was so strong that here, in a small city in the center of the country, local veterans started a refugee resettlement agency dedicated to helping them find a new life in Kansas.

# A company town looks to remake itself — one house sale at a time

Pacific Lumber is no more. Can the Humboldt County enclave it built find new life as a real estate gem?

SCOTIA, Calif. — The last time Mary Bullwinkel and her beloved little town were in the national media spotlight was not a happy period. Bullwinkel was the spokesperson for the logging giant Pacific Lumber in the late 1990s, when reporters flooded into this often forgotten corner of Humboldt County to cover the timber wars and visit a young woman who had staged a dramatic environmental protest in an old-growth redwood tree.

Julia “Butterfly” Hill — whose ethereal, barefoot portraits high in the redwood canopy became a symbol of the Redwood Summer — spent two years living in a thousand-year-old tree, named Luna, to keep it from being felled. Down on the ground, it was Bullwinkel’s duty to speak not for the trees but for the timber workers, many of them living in the Pacific Lumber town of Scotia, whose livelihoods were at

stake. It was a role that brought her death threats and negative publicity.

The timber wars have receded into the mists of history. Old-growth forests were protected. Pacific Lumber went bankrupt. Thousands of timber jobs were lost.

But Bullwinkel, now 68, is still in Scotia. And this time, she has a much less fraught mission — although one that is no less difficult: She and another longtime Pacific Lumber employee are fighting to save Scotia itself, by selling it off, house by house.

After the 2008 bankruptcy of Pacific Lumber, a New York hedge fund took possession of the town, an asset it did not relish in its portfolio. Bullwinkel and her boss, Steve Deike, came on board to attract would-be homebuyers and remake what many say is the last company town in America into a vi-

# Fire-scarred businesses still struggling

Some owners are rebuilding in Los Angeles area; others have given up

The charred remains of the historic Pacific Palisades Business Block cast a shadow over a once-bustling shopping district along West Sunset Boulevard.

Empty lots littered with debris and ash line the street where houses and small businesses once stood. A year since the Palisades fire roared through the neighborhood, only a handful of businesses have reopened.

The Starbucks, Bank of America, and other businesses that used to operate in the century-old Business Block are gone. All that remains of the Span-

ish Colonial Revival building are some arches surrounding what used to be a busy retail space. The burned-out, rusty remnants of a walk-in vault squat in the center of the structure.

Nearby, the Shade Store, the Free-est clothing store, Skin Local spa, a Hastens mattress store, Sweet Laurel Bakery and the Hydration Room are among the many stores still shuttered. The barbershop Gornik & Drucker doesn’t know if it can reopen.

“We have been going back and forth on what it would take to survive,” co-owner Leslie Gornik said. “If we open, we have to start over from scratch.”

## Noise and recklessness rumble back with vengeance

Its serpentine curves have entranced drivers for decades, and even lured some to their death.

# Auto crashes, costly surgeries and big payouts

Small L.A. law firm that grew into a powerhouse is drawing scrutiny

Sereen Banna said the partners of Downtown LA Law Group called her “Erin Brockovich” for her work helping hundreds sue over noxious fumes spewing out of a landfill in northern Los Angeles County.

An ambitious paralegal, Banna said she embraced the role she had in empowering residents to take on companies suspected of polluting their neighborhoods.

Her bosses were proud too, she said. Banna, 28, recalled them saying she would make them all billionaires someday.

But in early 2024, Banna said, she discovered a troubling trend in some of the firm’s most lucrative cases: Clients who claimed they were paid before joining lawsuits.

On Dec. 16, Banna sued

Downtown LA Law Group, also known as DTLA, stating the firm failed to address her complaints about “illegal solicitation, as well as deceptive and unethical practices aimed at persuading individuals to become clients through misrepresentations.”

She accused the firm, which she left in the fall of 2024, of amassing plaintiffs through “practices that appeared designed to exploit vulnerable individuals.”

DTLA called the allegations “baseless,” saying they came from a disgruntled former employee.

“Any allegations of fraud, paid referrals, or unethical practices by DTLA Law Group are not only unsubstantiated, but false,” the firm said in a statement. “We

# Trump’s first year sparks a legal war

Federal executive and judicial branches fight over the future of the rule of law in the U.S.

A few months into President Trump’s second term, federal appeals court Judge J. Harvie Wilkinson III — a conservative appointee of President Reagan — issued a scathing opinion denouncing what he found to be the Trump administration’s unlawful removal of Kilmar Abrego Garcia to his native El Salvador, despite a previous court order barring it.

“The government is asserting a right to stash away residents of this country in foreign prisons without the semblance of due process that is the foundation of our constitutional order. Further, it claims in essence that

because it has rid itself of custody that there is nothing that can be done,” Wilkinson wrote. “This should be shocking not only to judges, but to the intuitive sense of liberty that Americans far removed from courthouses still hold dear.”

Two months later, U.S. District Judge William G. Young, also a Reagan appointee, ripped into the Trump administration from the bench for its unprecedented decision to terminate hundreds of National Institutes of Health grants based on their perceived nexus to diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives.

Young ruled the cuts were “arbitrary and capricious” and therefore illegal. But he also said there was a “darker aspect” to the case that he had an “unflinching obligation” to call out — that the administration’s actions amounted to “racial dis-

# Joy, then dread for Venezuelans in U.S.

Trump administration urges deportations as its travel warning underscores peril.

By ANDREA CASTILLO

WASHINGTON — After President Trump ordered strikes that led to the capture of Venezuela’s president, Nicolás Maduro, celebrations erupted in Venezuelan communities across the United States.

But for many of the hundreds of thousands of Venezuelan immigrants facing possible deportation, their relief and joy was cut by the fear about what comes next from an administration that has zeroed in on Venezuelans as a target.

“Many of us asked ourselves, ‘What’s going to happen with us now?’” said A.G., a 39-year-old in Tennessee who asked to be identified by her initials because she lacks legal status. Even so, Maduro’s ouster gave her a lot of hope for her mother country.

Venezuelans began fleeing in droves in 2014 as economic collapse led to widespread food and medicine shortages, as well as political repression. Nearly 8 million Venezuelans are now living outside the country — including 1.2 million in the U.S.

A.G. and her now-18-year-old son arrived at the southern border in 2019. Since then, she said, they have built a good life — they own a transport company with delivery trucks, pay taxes and follow the law.

Maduro’s fall left her with mixed feelings.

“He’s obviously a dictator, many people have died because of him and he refused to give up power, but the reason that they entered Venezuela, for me what President Trump did was illegal,” she said. “Innocent people died because of the bombs. I’m asking God that it all be for good reason.”

Dozens of Venezuelans and others were killed in the U.S. invasion — more than 100, a government official said — including civilians.

The Trump administra-

Tehran hardens crackdown on protesters 'working for Trump'

Biggest regime threat in years Internet blackout cuts Iran off Warning of harsh punishment

ANDREW ENGLAND — LONDON

Iran signalled it was hardening its crack-down against protesters yesterday as an internet blackout cut off the Islamic republic from the outside world while authorities battled to contain the biggest unrest in years.

After demonstrations intensified across Tehran and other cities, Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei accused protesters of acting on behalf of Donald Trump and vowed his government would not back down.

The protests present the biggest domestic threat to the regime in several years, erupting as the country grapples

with a plunging currency and soaring inflation. In a speech on state television, Khamenei warned: "If you work for foreigners, the nation . . . will reject you."

"There are people whose work is destruction. Last night in Tehran, for example, they set fire to a government building — a building that's their own, that belongs to their country — in order to please the US president," he said.

Iran's judiciary chief, Gholamhossein Mohseni-Ejei, later warned that the punishment for protesters "will be decisive, maximum and without any legal leniency", according to Tasnim, a state-affiliated news agency.

Diplomats fear that the regime could

use the cover of the internet blackout to suppress the protests.

Trump has repeatedly threatened to come to the "rescue" if the regime kills demonstrators. He said on Thursday that Iran had "been told very strongly . . . that if they do that, they're going to have to pay hell".

State media have confirmed 17 deaths since the protests erupted last month, some of whom were security forces members, along with dozens of arrests.

The Human Rights Activists News Agency said the death toll had hit 42.

Tehran's mayor said banks, mosques and buildings linked to the Basij militia, a branch of the Revolutionary Guards,

were attacked. Protesters have chanted angry anti-regime slogans, including "death to the dictator", a reference to Khamenei, 86, who has ruled since 1989.

The demonstrations began in late December after shopkeepers in Tehran shut stores in protest at rising prices, and have since spread to provincial cities and towns.

"We are seeing the system struggling to respond to a momentous wave of protests," said Sanam Vakili, head of the Middle East programme at Chatham House. "Without significant structural changes, [the regime] will be at a dead end."

Trader Rokos pays himself £477mn as hedge fund surges in volatile markets

COSTAS MOURSELAS HEDGE FUND CORRESPONDENT

Chris Rokos paid himself almost half a billion pounds last year as his macro hedge fund soared in a highly volatile period for markets.

Rokos Capital Management paid £477mn in profits to its highest-paid partner in the year to March 2025, the largest amount since a £509mn payout in 2021, accounts filed to Companies House showed.

While the accounts do not disclose the identity of the highest-paid partner, this is widely believed to be Rokos, who is the firm's founder, majority owner and key risk taker.

Rokos Capital declined to comment.

The hedge fund makes bets on key economic indicators such as inflation and interest rates through asset classes

including commodities, equities and bonds.

Rokos is one of the world's best-known hedge fund traders and a co-founder of macro hedge fund behemoth Brevan Howard.

Rokos Capital was up 21 per cent last year in its lowest-fee share class, according to a person who had seen the numbers, enjoying wild swings in equity, bond and commodity markets that proved the best year for macro hedge funds since 2009.

The fund returned 31 per cent in 2024, which primarily contributed to the profits in this set of accounts, and 8.8 per cent the previous year.

The accounts also showed that revenues more than doubled from £445mn to £1.2bn and that the profit pool available for partners was a record £940mn.

Rokos is the main risk taker at his

\$22bn hedge fund, supported by analysts and a team of senior investment professionals the firm calls investment officers. This approach is in contrast to most other hedge funds of a similar size, which have multiple key portfolio managers who make trades independently of each other.

After a disastrous 2021, when the fund lost a quarter of its value, performance has radically improved, increasing 51 per cent in 2022, with positive returns every year since.

Other hedge funds, including Caxton Associates and Graham Capital, also enjoyed a strong 2025, as the sector enjoyed winning bets on copper, gold and a weakening dollar.

Rokos's old firm Brevan Howard had a mixed year, with its Master fund up an estimated 0.75 per cent and its Alpha Strategies fund up roughly 8 per cent.

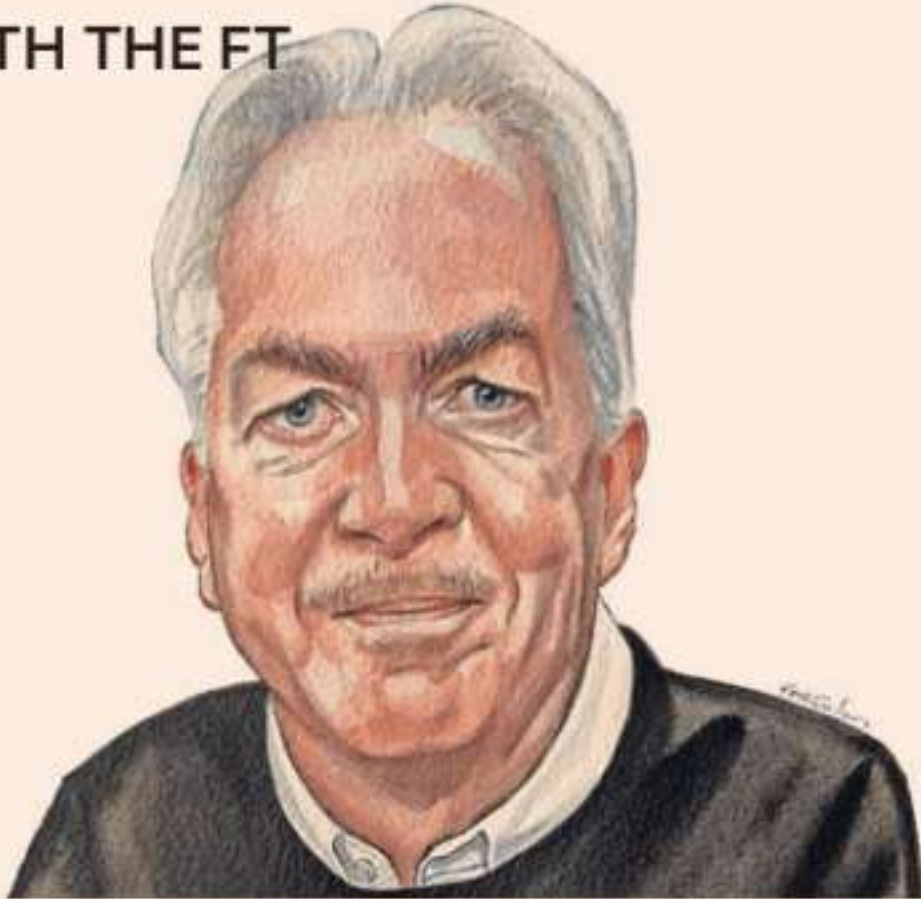

### En Iran, le prix de la liberté

À quatre reprises déjà depuis 1999, le régime des mollahs s'est maintenu au pouvoir à Téhéran en noyant dans le sang la colère des Iraniens. La nouvelle flambee de contestation apparue fin décembre, qui ne cesse de s'étendre dans le pays, va-t-elle finir de la même manière, dans le deuil et le désespoir? L'ayatollah Khamenei choisit à nouveau la répression brutale - déjà une cinquantaine de morts -, confirmant son isolement et son aveuglement. Non, bien sûr, il ne reculera pas devant les « saboteurs » soupçonnés de « plaire au président américain », cet « arrogant » aux mains « tachées du sang des Iraniens ». Lui-même en est pourtant inondé jusqu'au turban! Dans ce pays aux richesses épuisées par l'incompétence et la corruption des dirigeants, les citoyens coupés du monde devraient s'estimer heureux de la dernière faveur du « guide » : un ticket alimentaire de... sept dollars par mois.

Il faudrait pourtant, cette fois, que la liberté l'emporte et que la volonté populaire fasse basculer ce régime d'airain. L'irréformable théocratie-kleptocratie est de plus en plus ouvertement désignée comme la cible de la révolte - et son renversement comme le seul

remède. Les circonstances pourraient y contribuer. Complice des massacres du Hamas le 7 octobre 2023, l'Iran a subi dans la foulée des coups sévères : frappes israélo-américaines contre son programme nucléaire clandestin, démantèlement de l'« axe chiite » à travers l'Irak, la Syrie et le Liban, sanctions économiques renforcées... Avec Donald Trump à la Maison-Blanche, contraint seulement par sa « moralité », la menace de nouveaux raids en cas de tueries de civils pourrait se concrétiser. Les gardiens de la révolution, l'armée, le pouvoir politique même en feraient les frais.

L'Iran n'est pas le Venezuela. Mais cela suffirait-il? L'Iran n'est pas le Venezuela. Le système y est capable de changer de tête pour assurer sa survie. Et il reste de fortes craintes d'éclatement dans ce kaléidoscope ethnique, qui ramènent souvent la majorité autour du pouvoir. Cette peur du vide peut d'ailleurs expliquer le retour en grâce de l'héritier du chah, Reza Pahlavi. Car les Iraniens savent que la clique islamiste ne tombera pas sans combattre. Et qu'elle fera monter aussi haut que possible le prix de la liberté face au peuple désarmé. ■

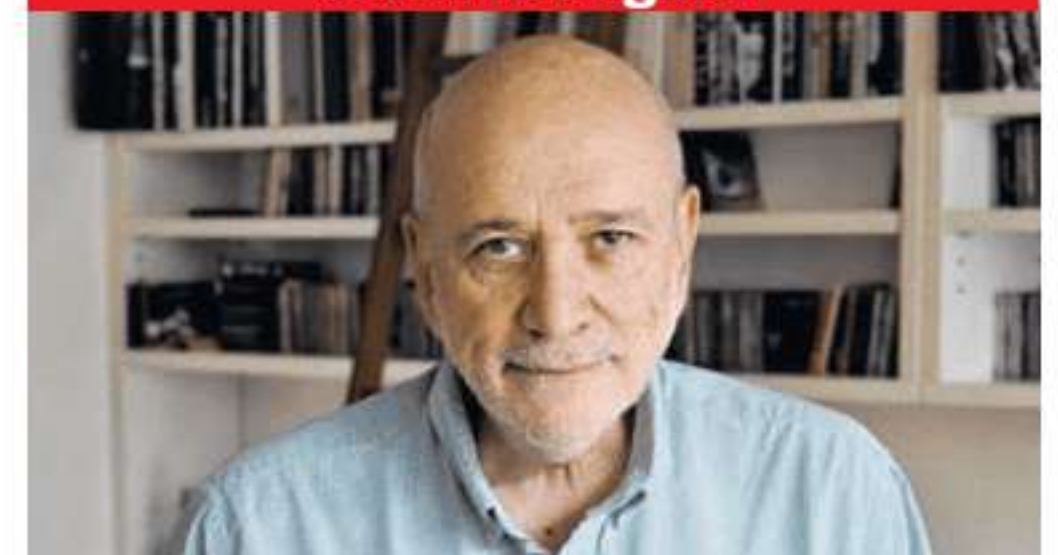
